## **ENTRY RULES**

- All entry forms to be returned to the Show Secretaries by Friday 30<sup>th</sup> August 2024, not later than 4pm.
   NO ENTRY FORMS WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER THIS TIME.
- 2. One entry form for each exhibitor, please download an entry form per person or get a printed copy from the Secretary if required.
- 3. Entry Fees: All adult classes 40p. Children's classes H, I & J Free
- 4. Maximum of two entries per person, per class but only one certificate per person, per class will be awarded.
- 5. All produce shown must have been grown in the gardens or allotments of the exhibitors.
- 6. All exhibits to be staged **between 8.00am and 9.30am on Sunday 1**st **September 2024** in the Recreation Field Marquee.
- 7. Judging will commence at 10.00am sharp.
- 8. Prizes will be awarded as detailed under "Prizes and Cups"

#### THE JUDGE'S DECISION WILL BE FINAL

Note: Whilst every care will be taken, the Produce and Handicraft Show Committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage to the exhibits, containers or any other items belonging to the exhibitors. Children's prize money can be collected from 4pm and the Cups will be presented at 4.15pm followed by the Auction of donated entries.

<u>Please Note</u>: Please use the entrance for the Recreation Field from the B4042 marked with a sign for Brinkworth Village Show. You will be able to drive up to and park near the rear entrance of the marquee to set up your entries. You will be expected to leave the Recreation Field in time for judging to commence at 10.00am.

The Recreation Field will re-open at 11.00am for the day's attractions. The Produce and Handicraft marquee, showing your exhibits, will open at 1.00pm for viewing.

Exhibits should be clearly marked NFS if they are not for sale. **Please do not remove exhibits from display until 4.00pm so that everyone can enjoy seeing them.** Items not marked NFS (or donated by exhibitors) will be sold by auction at 4.15pm to help to raise money the running costs of the show.

# Class 68 – Afghan Cocoa & Cornflake Biscuits Recipe by Mary Berry

#### <u>Ingredients</u>

175 g spread for baking (e.g. butter/stork margarine)100g caster sugar150g plain flour2 level tablespoons cocoa50g crushed cornflakes

#### Method

Heat the oven to 180c/160c fan/Gas 4 and grease baking sheets.

Cream the spread and sugar together until soft and then gradually work in the flour, cocoa and, lastly, the crushed cornflakes.

Shape the mixture into small balls the size of a walnut and place well spaced, on the baking sheets. Press each ball down with two fingers.

Bake in the oven for 15 to 20 minutes, lift off and leave to cool on a wire rack and then store in an airtight tin when cold.

Makes 30 to 35 biscuits

How to do it – Hard boil an egg, enjoy eating the egg but don't take away to much of the shell top. Wet some cotton wool and put it on top of some kitchen paper. Fill the empty egg shell with the kitchen roll and cotton wool. Make sure there is a gap between the cotton wool and the top of the egg shells. Put some **cress** seeds on the cotton wool and press them down gently. Put your egg shells in a sunny, warm spot - try a kitchen windowsill. Decorate your old egg box and egg head. - 107. Item of 3D craft work in any medium e.g. Origami, piece of pottery, piece of wooden handicraft, metalwork.
- 108. A piece of jewellery in any medium e.g. earrings, necklace, friendship bracelet

(Entries for class 110 may be attached to the entry form and posted through the letter box at Fiddlers Green with 40p entrance fee.)

#### **Helpful hints:**

- Paper plates are useful for displaying lots of different entries
- Remember to read any specific display instructions in the schedule
- Please put a NFS (Not for Sale) label on your entry only if you <u>can't be there</u> at 4.00pm to collect them and would like the item kept aside from the auction.
- ❖ If a child enters an adult class, please state the age of the child on the front of the entry on a sticker so the judge is aware it is a child's entry.
- Section A to C Slugs are a gardener's nightmare try crushing egg shells and scatter then around vulnerable young plants and seedlings.

- Section A When Cherry Tomatoes start to form, nip off the end of the flowering truss to encourage bigger fruits.
- ❖ In Section D Floral Art a novice is a person who has not previously won a "First" in Floral Art class 29, 30 or 31
- ❖ In Section F Photography the size of print should be no larger than 18cm x 12.5 cm (7" x 5").
- ❖ Section G Jars of Jam, Curd, Marmalade or Honey please remember to put the date it was made on the label
- Section G Jars of Chutney should have a new lid not a reused lid from an old jam jar.
- ❖ In Section G Please cover all baked goods with cling film
- ❖ In Section H Class 78a Don't plant too early or your egg head might need a hair cut!
- ❖ In Section I Class 89 the plane will be judged by flight distance on the morning of Sunday 4<sup>th</sup> September. All planes will be flown by the show judge.
- ❖ In Sections H, I, J Don't forget to pick up extra stickers at the registration desk on Sunday 1st September to put your age on your entries.
